

## 2019 NATIONAL LATIN EXAM SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS

The National Latin Exam is pleased to announce the winners of this year's \$2,000 scholarships. The NLE has designated one of these scholarships, given by an anonymous donor, as the Doris Kays Memorial Scholarship. Doris served for many years as Chair of the NLE Scholarship Committee. Our scholarship winners became eligible as high school seniors because they won gold medals on the 2019 NLE level III, IV, V, or VI exams. These scholars must take two semesters of Latin or ancient Greek language as college freshmen. They will be eligible to renew their scholarships each year if they continue their study of Latin or Greek. As juniors and seniors, they are required to have a declared major of Classics, Latin, or Greek. Below are the names of the winners, their high schools, Latin teachers, and the colleges or universities that they are attending.

To honor Linda's lifelong passion for the study of Latin and her over forty years of service to the National Latin Exam, the New Latin Educators scholarship, which funds the training of future Latin teachers, will be named in her honor. Linda's legacy will continue through the National Latin Exam's commitment to supporting and funding emerging educators, which will continue to offer the support and encouragement that Linda has shared with Latin learners of all ages since the exam's beginning.

Patty Lister has served on the National Latin Exam Writing Committee since 2008, and she has taught Latin for more than 25 years in Virginia. Patty is enthusiastic about joining Mark Keith as a co-chair for the exam, and she is deeply honored to follow in Linda's legendary footsteps. She currently teaches at Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology. Beyond her leadership in the classroom, she is the vice-president for the Classical Association of Virginia, and she also teaches a course at the University of Virginia biennially on Latin pedagogy. ## **Latin Teachers Can Administer Exam**



Salvete, omnes! The National Latin Exam Committee is pleased to announce that Latin teachers are allowed to be the primary and even sole administrator and supervisor when their students are taking the exam. We still encourage teachers to enlist the aid of other teachers and school personnel as proctors and assistants, particularly if you have a large number of students participating. Latin teachers will still be required to designate a principal, headmaster, or other school official who will receive the exam and keep it locked up until the time of the test. We are making this change after very many requests from teachers and administrators and much deliberation and discussion from members of the NLE Committee.


Sight reading is critical for improving reading skills. To that end, we hope that this book will prove to be a helpful resource for teachers and students across the country. The book is spiral bound to allow for ease of photocopying sight passages. Teachers are encouraged to adapt and add to the questions as they see fit. Students are encouraged to practice reading previously unseen passages to improve their comprehension of Latin. This book is a compilation of the efforts of those who have gone before, both ancient authors and recent exam writers, whose love of and care for the Latin

language are evident in these passages and questions.

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## THE LINDA S. MONTROSS NEW LATIN EDUCATORS SCHOLARSHIP



- A maximum of ten \$2000 scholarships are given each spring.
- The application deadline is February 15th.
- Each scholarship is renewable for however long the recipient is a student enrolled in a bachelor's or master's degree program with the intention of teaching Latin at the K-12 level. The maximum funding is four years for a bachelor's degree and two years for a master's degree (exceptions at the discretion of the scholarship committee).
- The NLE will cover the cost of attending one American Classical League Institute occurring from the end of their junior year in college through their third year of teaching. For more information on this conference see https://aclclassics.org/.
- Recipients will be offered informal mentoring by experienced Latin teachers for the first three years of teaching.

- Must be planning to teach Latin at the K-12 levels

## **National Latin Exam Offers Online Testing Option**

The NLE is not equipped to handle technical errors during the exam. The responsibility falls on the exam proctor to resolve technical issues during the exam. If you have concerns you may always contact Clement Testing Service at clementtestingservice@verizon.net or 1-800-459-9847.

We hope that many of you will decide to have your students take the exam online this year or in years to come!

As you fill out your application for the 2019 NLE, you will notice that you have the choice to give the exam via the traditional paper and pencil method, or you can have your students take the exam online. The same protocols still apply whether the proctor is giving the test online or on paper. All students taking the same level of the exam must take the exam at the same time.

You are also being asked to give us specific numbers for how many students at level III are taking the Latin III-IV Prose exam and how many students at level IV are taking the Latin III-IV Prose exam. The same is true the Latin III-IV Poetry exam and the Latin V-VI exam. Specific log-in codes will be provided for your students based on what level exam they are taking. Please fill out your application completely to provide accurate information.

If you choose the online testing option, you will receive an access code on your confirmation postcard. Please make sure to put your postcard in a safe place. About a week before you are scheduled to give the exam, you will be able to use your access code to obtain student logins for each student participating at your school. The proctor is still in charge of overseeing the administration of the exam.

## **PURPOSE**

The Christine Fernald Sleeper Educational Travel Award is designed to support teachers of Latin by encouraging educational travel. The award was developed in honor of Christine Sleeper, one of the "Founding Mothers" of the National Latin Exam and life-long travel enthusiast, in order to offer Latin teachers the opportunity to expand horizons for themselves and their students. This award may be used to enroll in an established program abroad, such as the American Academy in Rome, a trip to a classical site such as those offered by the Vergilian Society, or an educational trip of one's own design — something which Christine herself often advocated.

The recipients understand that they will share their travel experiences by means of a short article for the NLE newsletter and possible presentation at ACL (or regional or local meeting of classicists).

## **ELIGIBILITY**

Applicants must be current full-time teachers of Latin with at least three years of experience at the middle school/ high school/ community college/ college level who offer the NLE to their students. Applicants are eligible for the award only once every ten years. If you are currently receiving another scholarship from the National Latin Exam, you are not eligible to apply for this award. If you currently serve on one of the NLE Committees, you are not eligible to apply.

## **FUNDING**

The applicant will present a proposal and a budget for expenditures at the time of application, up to the award limit of \$5,000.

## **NUMBER OF AWARDS**

There will be one award granted for the period of March 2020 through February 2021.

## PURPOSE The James Herr

The Jane Harriman Hall Professional Development Scholarship is designed to support teachers in their ability to teach Latin. The scholarship was developed in honor of Jane Harriman Hall, founder of the National Latin Exam, in order to continue her efforts to bring high quality Latin instruction to students throughout the United States. Examples of Professional Development opportunities are course work at a college/university, participation in an oral Latin summer course, and attendance at a classical conference.

## **ELIGIBILITY**

Applicants must be current teachers of Latin at the pre-K-12 level in a public or private school who spend at least 50% of their instructional time with Latin students. Applicants are eligible for the award only once every ten years. If you are currently receiving another scholarship from the National Latin Exam, you are not eligible to apply for this award. If you currently serve on one of the National Latin Exam Committees, you are not eligible.

### **FUNDING**

Scholarships will be awarded based on the impact they will have on students and effective use of the funds. A total of \$5,000 will be allocated to the scholarship annually. This may result in one or more awards being given, based on the number and quality of the proposals.

## **TERM OF THE AWARD**

This annual scholarship may be used any time from March 2020 through February 2021.

## TOVAH KEYNTON,

WINNER OF THE JANE HARRIMAN HALL PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SCHOLARSHIP, TALKS ABOUT HER EXPERIENCES

The Jane Harriman Hall Professional Development Scholarship afforded me the opportunity to participate this summer in the most enjoyable professional development I can imagine - learning with and from other Latin educators while traveling around Italy.

The program I chose, run by the Vergilian Society and entitled "The Italy of Caesar and Vergil: A Workshop for Teachers," immediately appealed to me for a variety of reasons. I am the only Latin teacher at my small school, so it was such a treat to work closely with other teachers in my discipline. Our classroom sessions quickly became collaborative workshops in which we could exchange ideas, share questions and challenges, and build lasting relationships to carry into future opportunities for collaboration.

In addition to the interpersonal benefits, the tour leaders, Amy Leonard and Professor Steve Tuck, exceeded my expectations in the breadth and depth of information and experiences we were able to squeeze into less than two weeks. I returned home with countless ideas and photos to enrich my thematic units in Latin 1 and 2, and provide a sense of place and realism to my students reading ancient authors in the upper levels.

A theme of this trip, and a particular interest of mine, was the pairing of archaeological sites and material culture with literary episodes - Trajan's column panels with scenes from Caesar, for example, or Augustan monuments with Aeneid Books VI and VIII. On one particularly immersive day, we hiked to the top of Mt. Vesuvius in the morning, spent the afternoon wandering the streets of Herculaneum, and that night, back at our villa not far from Pliny's own at Misenum, we read his account of the eruption and its aftermath - in Latin of course. And the next day at Pompeii I finally captured a long-desired photo framing Vesuvius and an umbrella pine to illustrate Pliny's description of the eruption's appearance.

As we traveled to the various locations, we took turns reading aloud Latin excerpts from Vergil, Caesar and beyond, which Amy and Steve had carefully selected to tie into our site visits. These readings truly enriched my appreciation for the places we went - who but a group of Classicists would get such delight in hearing Vergil's verses ringing through the halls of the Sibyl's grotto?

Along the way I realized some unexpected benefits of this program, such as a renewed appreciation for the student experience - its delights and its challenges. In the evenings a group of us gathered for a voluntary reading group, with someone suggesting a different author each night. Over the course of a week we worked our way through selections from Caesar and Vergil, naturally, but also from Nepos, Martial's *De Spectaculis, Ovid's Heroides,* and more. Some of these were old favorites of course, but other passages were completely new to me or ones that I hadn't read in ages. As I stumbled over an unfamiliar word or hesitated as I gathered my thoughts in front of an audience of my peers, I reminded myself that this is what we ask our students to do every day.

Finally, if all of the above were not enough, my students get a teacher who is starting the school year with renewed enthusiasm for the subject matter, excited to share new information and stories with them. It's something a bit more abstract, but for which I am particularly grateful to the NLE organization and all involved in making this experience a reality.



## NOAH CHRISTINE FERNALD SLEEPER EDUCATIONAL TRAVEL AWARD, TALKS ABOUT HIS EXPERIENCE

Through the generosity of the Christine Sleeper Travel Award committee I was able to participate in the Classical Summer School at the American Academy in Rome this past summer. This six-week program is designed to help teachers, graduate students and undergraduates better understand the growth and development of Rome through an investigation of material culture. Under the direction of Professor Gretchen Meyers, we traveled to a plethora of sites and museums inside the city of Rome such as the Domus Aurea, Palazzo Massimo, San Clemente and the Ludus Magnus to name a few. In addition, we ventured outside the city to sites such as Tarquinia, Cerveteri, Lavinium, Sperlonga and Capua among others. I particularly appreciated the opportunity to visit the latter group of sites since they would have been challenging to access if I had been traveling on my own. When we were not occupied by our peregrinations, we had access to the library at the American Academy, a fantastic resource. Our days often featured meals at the academy as well, which were delightful. It is not every day that one has the opportunity to sit amongst learned colleagues and a throng of visiting fellows, all distinguished scholars and artists. Every dinner at the academy truly felt like a symposium.



Overall the program was a wonderful experience and I learned much that I hope to incorporate into my teaching this year. I am always searching for ways to make the complexities of Roman history accessible for all my students and to facilitate them exploring their own interests within Greek and Roman culture. Visiting sights such as Largo Argentina, the former location of the Theatre of Pompey and the archaeological site at the Church of Sant'Omobono in succession was particularly inspiring in that regard. These visits helped me realize how teaching the triumph as the event most representative of the Roman *ethos* could open many avenues of profitable discourse with my students and create an opportunity for personalized learning. As a result, I am planning to institute a project-based cultural unit in my classes centered around the triumph. After learning about the various aspects of the procession, students could pursue a research topic of their choice connected to the celebration of a triumph. These topics could include Pompey's third triumph, the representation of Dacians in the Forum of Trajan and the role of coins in mythologizing Roman military leaders to name a few.

I was also inspired by the productive uses of technology at archaeological sites in Rome, particularly the Domus Aurea. Seeing Nero's summer palace in its heyday through a VR headset was one of the most incredible experiences of my life and I resolved then and there to attempt to recreate that experience in the classroom for my students. I am fortunate to teach at a school that has VR headsets and I will be lobbying for funds to purchase Rome Reborn, a series of apps that allows the user to take a tour of various ancient Roman monuments. I became aware of these apps this summer when their creator, Professor Bernie Frischer, came and spoke to us at the American Academy. After experiencing some of the apps myself, I am sure that my students will thoroughly enjoy them and learn a good deal in the process.

I would like to reiterate how grateful I am to the Christine Sleeper Travel Award committee for facilitating my attendance at the Classical Summer School. I would highly recommend it to anyone eligible to attend. It is truly a fantastic learning opportunity and one that I will treasure for a lifetime.

## THE NATIONAL LATIN EXAM SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

The NLE Scholarship Committee is composed of six readers: three college professors and three high school teachers plus the Chair. Only two professors and two high school teachers serve as readers each year. The applications are read several times prior to the selection of the sixteen scholarship winners and five alternates. The first screening is done by the Chair. A second screening is then done to determine which applications will be sent to the readers. Approximately ninety applications are sent to the readers for a third reading. Each reader selects his top thirty-five applications and returns these selections to the chair. At this time, the committee members' choices are collated, and the winners are chosen. The names of the scholars are announced at The American Classical League Institute late in June.

## NATIONAL LATIN EXAM WRITING COMMITTEE

The individual members of the Writing Committee, all seasoned teachers with experience using a wide variety of textbooks and teaching methods, begin writing the exams each spring. By the middle of August the members, meeting together as a committee, begin the difficult task of reviewing each exam with respect to the level of difficulty, accuracy, and content. After numerous revisions, the exams are sent to the consultants for their in-depth critiques. Acting upon their suggestions, the committee makes further changes. After a final review, fine-tuning, and proofing, the exams are printed and sent to the schools.

It usually takes the committee twelve to fifteen sessions averaging three to four hours each to complete the work associated with the exams. In addition to the general working sessions, each committee member spends hours taking care of specific tasks such as answering correspondence, word processing, record keeping, publicizing the exam, and writing newsletter articles.
